According to the dictionary, *regifting* is "to give someone a gift that was previously received from someone else." What would happen if this Christmas we were to take a serious look at all we have received from the Lord, and instead of keeping these gifts all to ourselves, what if we were to celebrate the birth of Christ by *regifting* these gifts to others? To deliberately and purposefully pass them on to others in desperate need of these gifts? That's what this series is all about.

The angels proclaim the coming of Jesus is "good news of great joy for all people". Why is the coming of Jesus good news of great joy?

• The Messiah is here and He has come to rescue us from our sin and give us eternal life, now and forever! (The natural response to this good news is joy!)

- Greek: "chara" = joy; "charis" = grace. Our joy is rooted in God's grace.
- "Joy is delight in God and His salvation for the sheer beauty and worth of who He is. Its opposite is hopelessness and despair and its counterfeit is elation that comes with blessings not the Blesser." (Tim Keller)
